Michael is a professor of medicine at LSHTM and an honorary consultant in infectious diseases at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases, University College Hospital London. He works across the Pacific and Africa with a particular focus on neglected tropical diseases and sexually transmitted infections.

Dr Su Mar Lwin Dermatology Registrar



Su is a Burmese-born dermatology registrar at St John's Institute of Dermatology and honorary lecturer at King's College London. She moved from Burma (Myanmar) to the UK at the age of 15 and qualified in medicine from Guy's, King's and St Thomas' School of Medicine and obtained a PhD in stem cells and regenerative medicine at King's College London.

Su's research focuses on translational therapeutics for rare and common skin diseases—she pioneered a novel spray-on gene therapy for epidermolysis bullosa and stem cell therapy for psoriasis.

Su is also dedicated to global health dermatology—she is cofounder and trustee of the Burma Skincare Initiative (BSI), a UK-registered charity with the mission to promote excellence in skincare for the people of Myanmar. One of BSI's key innovations is Essential Emergency Skincare—a sustainable framework that ensures dermatological care for people at times of national crisis. With the aim of promoting the public profile of global health dermatology, the BSI has been selected to showcase the Burma Skincare Initiative Spirit of Partnership Garden at the RHS Chelsea Flower Show in May 2024 as the first ever Burma- and skin-themed garden in the 110-year history of this world-renowned flower show.

Dr Keerti Gedela HIV Consultant



Keerti is a consultant physician and researcher specialising in HIV and sexual health medicine at 56 Dean Street (CW). She has an MSc in Tropical Medicine and International Health, and is a fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and an honorary senior lecturer at Imperial College London. She is EDI Lead for the NIHR Clinical Research Network in North West London.

She has worked as an infectious diseases and HIV physician, researcher and lecturer within Southern Africa (Johannesburg, Soweto, Zambia), India, Brazil and Indonesia. She has provided senior clinical support for hospital and outpatient care in central and rural set-

He is the Clinical Director of South West London and Surrey Heartlands Maternal Medicine Network, where he oversees complex medical conditions pre-pregnancy. His main interests are conditions related to renal, obesity and diabetes. He is widely published in the field with more than 100 peer-reviewed papers.

Dr Ram Vadi UK-Med Health Director



Ram is a medical doctor with extensive experience in outbreak response, ongoing and protracted conflicts, and health system strengthening around the globe. Before joining UK-Med as health director, he was the team lead and medical coordinator for the UK EMT Beirut port blast response. He also worked for several years with the ICRC in Syria, Somalia and South Sudan—and in Guinea throughout the West African Ebola outbreak in 2014/15.

Dr Jack Milln Wellcome Trust Global Health PhD Fellow



Jack is a consultant obstetric physician and global health researcher undertaking a Wellcome Trust global health clinical PhD Fellowship with the University of Liverpool, based in Blantyre, Malawi. He is the principal investigator of the PRONE study—pregnancy and early recognition of NCDs. He previously worked at the Medical Research Council/Uganda Virus Research Institute and London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine Uganda Research Unit investigating the prevalence and risk factors of diabetes and hypertension in pregnant women.

Dr Bhargavi Rao LSHTM Humanitarian Public Health



Bhargavi spent 10 years working at Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) Operational Centre Amsterdam—including leading the emerging and infectious diseases portfolio—dividing her time among COVID-19, malaria and other infectious disease outbreaks. She has worked in humanitarian responses across multiple contexts, and is a public health clinician with a PhD in infectious disease epidemiology. She is one of the co-programme directors of the new distance-learning Health in Humanitarian Crises programme at LSHTM. She is co-editing the revised conflict and health

textbook which serves as the basis for the distance learning PHM214 conflict and health module. She is continuing in a part-time role at MSF as clinical research lead and malaria/infectious diseases advisor, and holds an honorary clinical position with UKHSA.

Jimmy is the president of the Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene. He has previously worked in The Gambia for Save the Children, and in Bo. Sierra Leone for the Medical Research Council, where he worked on ivermectin for onchocerciasis from 1986-90. He was team leader for the Medical Research Council programme on AIDS, based at the Uganda Virus Research Institute in Entebbe, from 1995-2002. He has been an academic staff member at the LSTM and the LSHTM, where he was professor of international public health from 1999-2004. Previously, Jimmy was head of international activities (2004-13), and population health (2013–15) at the Wellcome Trust, where he was responsible for strategy, policy and developing the scientific portfolio for research on population science and public health research in the UK and in LMICs. Jimmy is a member of the Scientific Advisory Committee for the WHO's R&D Blueprint for Action to Prevent Epidemics, a committee member of the Global Coordination Mechanism for R&D, a trustee for the RSTMH, and DTM&H examiner for the RCP. He chairs the Scientific Advisory

Group for Research for Health in Humanitarian Crises (R2HC) and is chair of the Ebola Biobank Governance Group for Public Health England.

Dr Nicky Longley UCLH RESPOND Refugee Health Service



Nicky trained in London, Uganda and South Africa and is an NHS consultant in infectious diseases and travel medicine at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases at UCLH. She is associate professor in travel medicine at the LSHTM. She is a member of the Faculty of Travel Medicine RCPSG, the International Expert Committee for Travel Medicine and TAG for NaTHNaC. She runs the short course in travel medicine and teaches the travel medicine component of the DTM&H at the LSHTM. She is also medical co-lead of RESPOND—a free, confidential health service hosted by UCLH for asylum seekers and refugees. Their staff have expertise in trauma-informed care and work with local, specialist and third sector services to ensure appropriate, timely and compassionate care.

Dr Julia Rozanova Programme Co-leader of the MSc in Global Mental Health, King's College London



Julia is a lecturer in global mental health at King's College London and co-directs the MSc in global mental health. Her research sits at the intersection of HIV.

addiction and ageing. Since 2014, she has worked in the Eastern Europe and Central Asia (EECA) region, developing and implementing primary and secondary HIV prevention and treatment interventions in the community and in prison settings. With EECA research and clinician partners, Julia has examined experiences of HIV diagnoses among older adults, and how peer navigation mitigates risky behaviours and barriers to HIV care in this group, including HIV status disclosure. Since the beginning of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, her research has increasingly focused on how HIV and addiction treatment systems cope during humanitarian crises, and what implications both the crisis itself and the coping strategies may have in the short and long term for service users and healthcare workers. She has co-edited (with Prof Sir John Strang, Alexandra Deac and Harry Skipper) a special issue in Frontiers of Public Health on this topic, and organised a series of research symposia.

Alexandra Deac KCL Mental Health Researcher



Alexandra is a postgraduate researcher at King's College London, Yale School of Medicine and University of East London, working across health system strengthening projects in global mental health. Her research endeavours included HIV and addiction system adaptations and health-seeking behaviours among vulnerable groups, collaborating closely with Dr Julia Rozanova. She co-founded (with Anna Peycheva and Renata

Solórzano de Souza) the Global Mental Health Humanitarian Coalition, bringing together diverse stakeholders in the humanitarian field to inform research and practice. She is particularly interested in improving the synergy between research and practice through engaging in bottom-up, participatory research approaches directly applicable to enhancing uptake and healthcare service delivery.

Prof Dennis Ougrin CAMHS Consultant, Co-Leader of UMAUK



Dennis graduated from medical school in Ukraine in 1998 and came to the Maudsley Hospital in the UK to undertake postgraduate training in child and adolescent psychiatry. He has worked as an NHS consultant child and adolescent psychiatrist establishing and leading intensive community care services at South London and Maudsley NHS Foundation Trust. He has also led the MSc in child and adolescent mental health. at King's College London and acted as chief investigator of major NIHR, MRC and charity-funded studies in the field of self-harm and intensive community care services. He has expertise in conducting randomised controlled trials in the fields of psychological therapy and mental health service models. He leads a programme of global mental health studies aimed at developing community mental health services in Ukraine and other low- and middle-income countries.

Dr Joy Clarke Acute Medicine Registrar and MSF Doctor



Joy is an NHS acute medicine registrar at University Hospitals Sussex NHS Foundation Trust. She has previously worked for MSF and Doctors of the World UK. She has worked in Zambia, South Sudan and Bangladesh and used POCUS in these low-resource settings.

Dr Richard Venn Consultant Anaesthetist



Richard is a consultant anaesthetist intensivist at University Hospitals Sussex NHS Foundation Trust. He is involved with the Association of Anaesthetists' SAFE team looking at anaesthetics in low resource settings. He has worked in Tanzania and other LMICs and is interested in developing critical care capacity in LMICs.

Dr Oliver Ross Consultant in Paediatric Critical Care and Anaesthesia



Oliver is a consultant in paediatric critical care and anaesthesia. His overseas work has been in service education and hospital programme support for district hospital health workers in Nepal and

elsewhere. He has worked with the AAGBI, ICRC, MSF and, latterly, Novick Cardiac Alliance in Ukraine and RCPCH Global in Nepal.

Tim Law Chief Operating Officer, David Nott Foundation



Tim is the David Nott Foundation's chief operating officer. He manages the dayto-day running of the charity to enable its provision of safe, skilled surgical care for all. Tim has a wealth of experience in senior leadership, strategic and operational positions, most recently at ShelterBox, an international disaster relief NGO. Prior to entering the humanitarian sector, he had a distinguished career as a diplomat and soldier, completing his service leading the British defence team in Beijing through the recent pandemic. The David Nott Foundation was set up in 2015 by Mr David Nott OBE, FRCS-an NHS consultant surgeon based in London where he specialises in vascular, trauma and cancer surgery—with his wife Elly. Mr Nott has volunteered for aid agencies MSF, the ICRC and Syria Relief. He has provided surgical treatment to patients in conflict and catastrophe zones in Bosnia. Afghanistan, Sierra Leone, Liberia, Ivory Coast, Chad, Darfur, Yemen, the DRC, Haiti, Iraq, Pakistan, Libya, Syria, Central African Republic, Palestine, Nepal and Ukraine, and established and led the teaching of the Surgical Training for the Austere Environment (STAE) course at the RCS. The foundation supports surgeons in developing their operating skills for war zones and austere environments and has now trained more than 1.600 doctors

through its bespoke Hostile Environment Surgical Training (HEST), anaesthesia, and obstetrics courses. It is developing an additional course in perioperative care. His faculty consists of highly experienced consultant surgeons and anaesthetists who deliver this training programme in countries impacted by conflict and other catastrophes around the world, with focus programmes in Palestine, Libya, Syria and Ukraine.
